Re: Comments on the Regional Assessment cooperation agreement

Dear Sir or Madam,

The Regional Assessment on the Ring of Fire region contemplates an assessment area that is almost entirely Marten Falls First Nation territory. We recognize that we have shared territory with Webequie First Nation in the Ring of Fire region but with this submission, we are providing our community's perspective and look forward to engagement with you on this matter.

The development in the Ring of Fire will come to impact Marten Falls First Nation more than any other community. An aggregation of impacts on neighbouring communities can perhaps help create a sense of what those impacts might be. Some might be concerned about impacts to the river, given their significant geographic distance, while others might be concerned about impacts to the watershed or animals they hunt, trap and fish. We acknowledge those concerns and hope and expect to understand them through direct engagement as a proponent. However, as a rights bearing community, we also expect a recognition of our traditional territory and the fact that we are the most impacted community. From the perspective of the Regional Assessment, this means that we expect that the Agency would engage our community substantially and in good faith. One measure of that is the relative effort made with the community and time spent with the community on this front, relative to other engagement and consultation activity. Similarly, while we expect to work directly with the Agency on an Agency led RA, we also want to clarify that the community will participate in any Indigenous led elements of the RA and as this project is on MFFN territory, the community would expect to lead those elements.

COVID has impacted all aspects of life and Marten Falls is no exception. We have changed many long-established ways of conducting business. Despite the issues we face, given the relative importance of this work to our community and as the most impacted community, we will

continue to work with the Agency and with Ontario on the RA. With this letter, please find a table of our comments attached.

We look forward to engaging with you in the near future.

Agreement Comment

P3. To provide information, knowledge and analysis regarding mine development activities and other existing and future physical activities in the Ring of Fire and their potential effects, in order to enhance the effectiveness and efficiency of future impact assessments for these activities in a way that helps protect the environment and health, cultural, social and economic conditions while also creating opportunities for sustainable economic development.

P4. An area centered on the Ring of Fire mineral deposits in northern Ontario, which reflects the specific underlying geological formations that represent the Ring of Fire mineral deposits as set out in Appendix A. This area encompasses the future mine development activities upon which the Regional Assessment's analysis of effects and associated recommendations will focus (see Section 2.3 and Appendix B Section 2.2 Items e) to j)).

P 4. 2.3 In identifying and considering potential positive and adverse effects, the Regional Assessment will focus on the following Assessment Priorities. These represent key environmental, social, cultural and economic components which may be affected by future mine development activities in the Assessment Area, but which are often challenging to address solely through individual project-level assessments and decisions, making a regional-scale approach to effects assessment and management appropriate and beneficial. This focus is intended to enable improved efficiency and effectiveness of future project impact assessments:

Comment from MFFN

Since this statement potentially covers existing projects lead by MFFN (NRL and MFCAR), how will the RA enhance the effectiveness and efficiency of existing Impact Assessments lead by the community? Is efficiency not a priority for ongoing MFCAR and NRL projects? The community is concerned that the initial onset of the RA will reduce the efficiency and potentially the effectiveness of existing Impact Assessments. What measure will be taken to ensure that there is no negative impact on existing impact assessments?

This implies that the RA is squarely focused on mining. Both of the existing road projects, (the NRL and WSR) go into that area. Would the RA focus on these projects?

Would this focus be limited to the impact of mining development activities and not on the roads? Or is the RA expected to be broader than mine-site specific activity?

How were the valued components selected? What was the rationale? Was any consultation done to select these VCs?

Marten Falls has expressed an interest in other VCs as well, which matter just as much to the community. Those VCs were described in the last submission. Will those VCs be considered by the RA, or would that be limited to individual impact assessments?

Lastly, please explain what is meant by "improved efficiency and effectiveness"? Do you expect that the RA will help make IAs in the region more efficient, i.e., enable proponents to complete an IA in a shorter duration?

Potential positive and adverse effects, including cumulative effects, on the Assessment Priorities;

In addition to the adverse effects of development, MFFN is highly interested in the potential positive effects of mining and related development on MFFN and in the region. This is the only development opportunity available to MFFN and the community has a deep interest in understanding any positive impacts, how they can be augmented, and how their provision can be insured to MFFN as the most affected community. The community would look for this information and analysis in the RA report and expects that this will not be a superficial exercise but will be conducted in-depth with due consideration for what it means to a remote community like MFFN.
