Not noted was the indirect effect this project would have on the areas of extraction. With the increase in storage capacity it would be expected that other projects would also increase for natural gas extraction, since there is more capability of storage within Alberta. Where is the increase in natural gas extraction activities anticipated to take place in order to keep the expanded facility at capacity? The lands being used for activities could have a direct effect on traditional land use activities.

- 2. Please describe how the potential effects of the Project could result in changes to your community's:
 - (a) physical and cultural heritage (e.g. ceremonial sites, burial sites, cultural landscapes) The increase in activity can discourage cultural practices as there is less safe space available to conduct. There as well needs to be extensive ground truth work done to verify many sacred sites (burial, pathways) as there is limited capacity as is to conduct.
 - (b) current use of lands and resources for traditional purposes (e.g. hunting, fishing, trapping)
 An increase in natural gas extraction activities in our traditional land use area will impact access and fragmentation, wildlife populations and habitat, air/soil/water quality. This in turn will reduce the traditional land use activities and discourage land users to be on the landscape. Many land users fear being on the land and interfering with operations unknowingly.
 - (c) structures, sites or things of historical, archaeological, paleontological or architectural significance (e.g. artifacts, important historic buildings or symbols) An increase in activity will mean more field verification and ground truthing will need to be done in timelier manner. Currently due to capacity constraints, majority of the field verification work is placed on the back burner, and applications are able to be approved before field work is verified.

 - (a) health, social or economic conditions (e.g. employment opportunities, easier access to goods and services, economic development, accessibility to health-care services):

Economically, this will benefit the community as a whole. There will be employment and educational opportunities, economic development opportunities as well as better quality of life due to these opportunities.

 This is threatened and can be lost if not preserved and recorded properly as well as reinvested in by the communities these projects impact. Many indigenous peoples can lose touch with their cultural practices and traditions due to the fact they are busy working and being productive members of their society

Expansion and increase of oil and gas activities encourages members to participate and take part in the industrial growth but in turn can discourage them from cultural practices and traditions. An example is that many indigenous languages are not spoken outside of the community, the industrial growth, including this project, contributes to the threat of many losses of indigenous language and practices. Awareness and integration within both systems is key.

- (b) sustainability, considering, for example, the interconnectedness and interdependence of human-ecological systems and the well-being of present and future generations. Increased activities contribute to the loss of indigenous culture and practice, allowing for harvesting time off where and when it is appropriate to Metis and First Nation employees. A continuous struggle is being able to find the time as well as take time off in a competitive industry to be able to harvest in the fall.

Increased activities contribute to the loss of indigenous culture and practice. Time and space are taken away and replaced with western capitalistic modalities.
