I currently hold a surface water license(License # <personal information removed>) for residential use and I am half way through building a house on my property <personal information removed> in <personal information removed> B.C. which will be supplied by this license. I am fully committed to the build. The proposed mine has in its "Initial Project Description" a proposal of water diversion, including both "ground water" and "surface water". The map in the initial project description shows this mine development will overlap the head waters of the spring in which I have a water license to. Now I believe there is legal protection from having one tampering with a person's water system in which they are licensed. If they divert the surface water with an open pit mine is there not legal protection for me and my water license? Or will there not be some form of compensation in form of "making one whole"?
