The Agency asks that federal authorities align expert advice with the Agency's approach to tailoring, which focuses on key issues or effects that are likely to be relevant to the public interest decision. Traditional lands are important to Indigenous communities for cultural and spiritual reasons, and activities during the construction and operation could potentially disrupt accessibility in the vicinity that would be used for hunting, gathering and spiritual reasons (Beardy's and Okemasis FN is the nearest First Nations, and is 68 km away ).
