2. Is your department or agency in possession of specialist or expert information or knowledge that may be relevant to the conduct of an impact assessment of the Project?

CIRNAC has expert information or knowledge that may benefit impact assessment or regulatory processes relative to the proposed project. Subject matter expertise that can be provided by CIRNAC includes the following:

Expert Information

- a) <u>Reconciliation:</u> CIRNAC has expertise on the implementation of the <u>Statement of Principles on the Federal Approach to Modern Treaty Implementation</u>.
- b) <u>Section 35 Aboriginal and Treaty Rights</u>: are recognised and affirmed by Section 35 of the *Constitution Act, 1982.* Aboriginal and treaty rights are captured in court decisions, historic treaties, modern treaties, and some self-government agreements. There are inclusions in agreements stemming from Recognition of Indigenous Rights and Self-Determination processes that involve or make reference to section 35 rights. CIRNAC can support federal departments and agencies in the following ways:
- CIRNAC provides guidance and advice to federal officials for fulfilling the legal duty to consult and, where appropriate, accommodate, when contemplating activities that may adversely impact Section 35 rights.
- CIRNAC supports the whole-of-government approach to implementing obligations pursuant to modern treaty, self-government and related agreements, including specific consultation-related provisions and protocols.
- CIRNAC leads negotiations of modern treaty, self-government, and related agreements (including consultation protocols) on behalf of the Government of Canada.

It is beneficial to engage with CIRNAC early on when projects may impact modern treaties. Assessment and regulatory assessment process should be conducted with in a manner that respects the <u>Cabinet Directive on the Federal Approach to Modern Treaty Implementation</u>.

- c) United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act (UNDA):
- CIRNAC supports the Government in Canada in implementing the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act (UNDA)*, which affirms the Declaration as a universal international human rights instrument with application in Canadian law.
- The Crown must take into account the UNDA when contemplating conduct that might adversely impact the rights of Indigenous peoples in Canada.

- d) The Aboriginal Treaty Rights Information System (ATRIS) is a web-based, geographic information system intended to help users identify the location of Indigenous groups, and to provide users with information pertaining to each Indigenous group's established or asserted Section 35 rights. ATRIS provides access to profiles, documents and maps that can be used to assist governments, industry and other interested parties in determining their consultation obligations and in carrying out their consultation research.
- e) Algonquins of Ontario Consultation Process Interim Measures Agreement (rcaanc-cirnac.gc.ca): There is an interim consultation agreement in place with Algonquins of Ontario that uses the settlement area as the area for consultation purposes. In this case the project area looks to be approx. 87 km south of the community of Bancroft.

Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIRNAC) will not exercise a power or perform a duty or function under any Act of Parliament in relation to the proposed Project,

or take any course of action that will allow the proposed Project to proceed in whole or in part.

4. Has your department or agency had previous contact or involvement with the proponent or other party in relation to the Project? (for example: an enquiry about methodology, guidance, or data; introduction to the project)

CIRNAC has had no previous contact or involvement with the proponent or other party in relation to the proposed project.

5. Does your department or agency have additional information or knowledge not specified, above, including information on the geographic, environmental, economic or social context of the project? (e.g. location of protected or sensitive areas, previous history between local communities and proponent or similar projects, local or regional social or economic concerns)?

Existing CIRNAC programs that may be able to address one or more of the above concerns include:

- <u>First Nation Adapt Program</u>: This program provides funding to First Nation communities located below the 60th parallel to assess and plan for the impacts of climate change on community infrastructure and emergency management. The program provides support for communities to address one or more of the following types of projects:
 - risk assessments of climate change impacts on community infrastructure or emergency management;
 - development and assessment of adaptation options;
 - cost-benefit analysis of adaptation options.

The floodplain mapping portion of the program provides support for communities to:

- develop floodplain maps (including drainage studies) in order to identify flood risks to local infrastructure and inform local decision-making;
- develop best practices, tools and adaptation options for flood management;
- o participate in regional watershed management processes;
- o collect and share regional watershed data.
- <u>Cultural Spaces in Indigenous Communities</u>: The program offers opportunities for Indigenous women, girls, and 2SLGBTQQIA+ individuals to access their cultures, languages and strengthen their identities through the construction or revitalization of spaces that support cultural activities within their communities. These spaces aim to support self-determination, increase safety, and promote Indigenous ways of knowing, doing and being.
- Indigenous Community-Based Climate Monitoring Program: The program supports
 community-led projects to monitor climate and the environmental effects of climate
 change on communities and traditional territories. The program builds capacity to
 support the design, implementation, or expansion of long-term, community-based
 Indigenous-led climate monitoring projects.
- <u>Nation Rebuilding Program</u>: The program will support nation rebuilding efforts that will contribute to increased capacity at the larger nation level. The provision of this capacity funding will promote:
 - the re-establishment of Indigenous nations; as self-defined and representing nationbased collectives. Could be linked by cultural or linguistic background, geographical area or historical treaty lines;

- an increase in the ability of Indigenous nations to take on greater sectoral responsibilities, thereby facilitating a phased-in approach to self-determination and ultimately self-governance;
- o an increase in the sense of unity within Indigenous nations;
- identification and agreement among member communities on priorities for action and approaches to issues; and,
- a reduction in the duplication of the resolution of issues at the individual First Nation or Indigenous community level by working as a collective at the nation-level.
- Federal Interlocutor's Contribution Program: The objective of the Federal Interlocutor's Contribution Program is to help to build capacity, and to maintain a relationship based on trust and respect between Métis and non-status Indian people and the Government of Canada. This is achieved by: maintaining political relations with their representative organizations; acting as the point of contact within the federal government; acting as an advocate of their issues within Cabinet; entering into contribution agreements to help to build organizational and institutional capacity; and, building stronger linkages with provincial governments. In order to achieve these objectives, the Program supports work with Métis, non-status Indian and off-reserve Indigenous organizations towards:
 - achieving practical ways of improving Métis and non-status Indians socio-economic conditions,
 - o increasing self-reliance, and
 - reducing dependency.
- Supporting Indigenous Women and 2SLGBTQQIA+ Organizations: This initiative provides dedicated and ongoing longer-term project funding to Indigenous women's and 2SLGBTQQIA+ organizations to support increased capacity enabling engagement with members and communities to inform the development of federal policy, programs and legislation. This funding provides the foundational capacity that allows organizations to advocate and influence based on the identified needs, priorities and interests of grassroots Indigenous women and 2SLGBTTQIA+. This program also provides funding to the three national Indigenous women's organizations to support the development of culturally competent/relevant GBA+ toolkits that could be accessed across federal departments and by proponents to ensure that the appropriate lens and are applied to a project.
- <u>Federal Initiative on Consultation</u>: To ensure Indigenous peoples have consultation and engagement capacity and are meaningfully participating in consultation and engagement activities.

The Agency asks that federal authorities align expert advice with the Agency's approach to tailoring, which focuses on key issues or effects that are likely to be relevant to the public interest decision.
