To date, Transport Canada has not had any role in this Project, has not exercised any power or performed a duty or function in relation to the Project, nor taken any course of action that would allow the Project to proceed in whole or in part. However, based on information provided in association with the designation request, we anticipate that if the Project were to proceed, compliance with the Canadian Navigable Waters Act (CNWA) will be required.

Based on information provided in association with the designation request, we anticipate that if the Project were to proceed, compliance with the Canadian Navigable Waters Act (CNWA) will be required. (e.g. "near-shore lake infilling", and "a multipurpose bridge connecting the island to the mainland".

Should Transport Canada have a role in this project under the Canadian Navigable Waters Act or other regulatory process, the department will conduct a pre-consultation assessment to determine if there will be the potential for adverse impacts to Section 35 Aboriginal and/or Treaty rights and/or Title as a result of the project and TC's Crown Conduct. In TC's pre-consultation assessment, TC may use existing consultation and/or regulatory processes to assist in its duty to consult assessment. Should TC determine that consultation is required, the department prefers to coordinate with other departments/ministries where possible to streamline the consultation process. To our knowledge, Transport Canada has had no involvement in relation to this Project to date.

The Project has the potential to cause adverse effects to navigation, however these can be readily mitigated through proper design of the bridges and adherence to appropriate construction practices. The CNWA review and authorization process will ensure that effective conditions are applied to the Project to prevent significant impacts to navigation.

Transport Canada has previously consulted with Indigenous Communities on other projects in the vicinity of this Project, and the department has some understanding of the concerns related to TC's mandate for this project area.

Any construction equipment, buildings, installations must comply with the **Toronto Island Airport Zoning Regulations (SOR/85-515)** (https://laws-lois.justice.gc.ca/eng/regulations/SOR-85-515/index.html). There will be applicable zoning requirements on allowable heights, natural growth and disposal of waste.

Also, it is highly recommended that the proponent consult with PortsToronto (operator of BBTCA) to ensure there are no adverse impacts on the airports operations/items required for certification. Also, NAV CANADA's Land Use Program (<a href="https://www.navcanada.ca/en/aeronautical-information/land-use-program.aspx">https://www.navcanada.ca/en/aeronautical-information/land-use-program.aspx</a>) should be consulted. NAV CANADA will evaluate any potential impacts to instrument flight procedures, which could greatly affect the usability of the airport.
