RE: Grassy Narrows says ‘no’ to nuclear waste storage in our watershed

I am writing on behalf of Grassy Narrows First Nation as the Director of the Grassy Narrows First Nation Land Protection Team in relation to the Impact Assessment process which has been initiated for the proposed Deep Geological Repository for Canada’s Used Nuclear Fuel Project (the “nuclear waste storage project”). Grassy Narrows says ‘no’ to nuclear waste in our Territory, in our region, and anywhere upstream or upwind of our Territory.

Grassy Narrows has been excluded from the process to date

Grassy Narrows was not informed of the Nuclear Waste Management Organization’s (“NWMO”) site selection process for the nuclear waste storage project and learned about this process independently around 2020, ten years after the site selection process was launched in 2010. Grassy Narrows was not meaningfully informed nor included in the site selection process, despite writing to NWMO several times to seek information to help us better understand NWMO’s decision-making process and to raise concerns about the process and the proposed nuclear waste storage project upstream of our Territory in the Wabigoon River watershed.

Ultimately, NWMO offered to meet with Grassy Narrows only at the very end of the selection process once the outcome was clear. Grassy Narrows’ grave concerns about the process and about the site were brushed aside and the site was selected against our strong objections.

Now, Grassy Narrows has also learned about the Impact Assessment process for the nuclear waste storage project independently through an Internet search. Grassy Narrows was left out of the pre-Impact Assessment process and the opportunity to have a meaningful impact on the Impact Assessment process for this project. This is the stage where the Impact Assessment Agency of Canada (“IAAC”) is supposed to engage with us to find out how to design a process that is meaningful for us. Instead, IAAC has launched a one-size-fits-all process that disregards our unique circumstances and our Indigenous laws and treats us as a mere stakeholder alongside snowmobile clubs and summer camps.

We have told the IAAC many times that we must be meaningfully involved from the very start of the assessment process, including the pre-planning stage. When we are not included, we are forced to try to catch up to an ill-suited and imposed process that is moving forward quickly without us. Any process that moves forward without us is not a fair process.

Grassy Narrows says 'no' to nuclear waste storage

The nuclear waste storage project is proposed 43 kilometres northwest of the Town of Ignace, Ontario at a site which is upstream of our Territory in the Wabigoon River watershed. We are deeply concerned that nuclear waste poses the potential for the escape of radioactive material because any escape would harm us for many generations and our lands would never be the same. Our watershed and our people have already suffered too many impacts from the results of industrial activity, including an ongoing mercury crisis. We cannot accept this further risk to the health of our lands, river, and people.

We urge you to review our previous letters to the NWMO (attached) and to include the concerns that we have raised in your Impact Assessment including, but not limited to:

1. Long term risk of escape of radioactivity;
2. Risk of radioactive escape during transport;
3. Downstream and downwind impacts of any radioactive escape;
4. Cumulative impacts of multiple past, current, and future industrial activity; and
5. Impacts of large numbers of outsiders, mostly men, entering our area and the associated risk of violence, especially gender-based violence, human trafficking, and drug trade.

We call on you to respect the decision of Grassy Narrows: we say 'no' to the proposed nuclear waste storage site near in the Wabigoon River watershed.

The standard is consent

The Impact Assessment Agency of Canada must meaningfully consult with and obtain Grassy Narrows' consent on the nuclear waste storage project. We expect that you will meaningfully consult, accommodate, and obtain our consent in a manner consistent with the Crown's duty to consult, the Honour of the Crown, the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples*, and Grassy Narrows' own laws, including the *Asubpeeschoseewagong Anishinabek Aaki Declaration*.

We remind you that Measure 51 of Canada's *UNDRIP Act* Action Plan states that "the Impact Assessment Agency will implement the *Impact Assessment Act* (IAA) in a way that aligns with the objectives and spirit of the UN Declaration," which includes the requirement of free, prior and informed consent.


We also urge you to consider this project within the context of the *National Strategy Respecting Environmental Racism and Environmental Justice Act* which recognizes that establishing environmentally hazardous sites, including nuclear waste storage sites, in areas inhabited primarily by members of Indigenous communities is a form of racial discrimination. There is no greater example of environmental racism in Canada than the

long legacy of industrial harm that has been forced on Grassy Narrows against our will with terrible consequences to our environment and people that continue today.

If these statutes are to have any meaning, and if Canada intends to honour its commitment to reconciliation and to preventing environmental racism, it must lead Canada to place the highest level of scrutiny and caution on any proposal for activities that risk more harm to Grassy Narrows. The proposed nuclear waste storage site is precisely such a project. Please confirm that Grassy Narrows' right to free, prior, and informed consent will be respected and that the project will not proceed without consent.

Dear Nuclear Waste Management Organization,

We just found out from a concerned person that there is a July 3, 2020 deadline for comments on a potential nuclear waste storage site in the Ignace area. This is too soon, and it is not fair to do this during a pandemic.

We have not been meaningfully involved in the process so far, and we do not have the capacity to look at the proposal in detail or to get experts to help us.

But we want to let you know that Grassy Narrows is strongly opposed to the storage of nuclear waste near Ignace, Ontario.

We are deeply concerned that nuclear waste will continue to be dangerous for thousands of generations. We are afraid that it will hurt our people and the environment that we rely on. The waste lasts longer than your experts can reliably predict.

Our people continue to drink the water from the English River and to eat fish, animals, and plants from this area. We have been doing this since before anyone can remember and we will continue to do this as long as the river flows. As Indigenous people who are in relationship with our land, air and water we are often the first to feel the impacts of pollution in the environment. We are also often the hardest hit and the last to get help.

From our experience with mercury dumping in Dryden that started in 1962 around 120 km upstream from us, we know that pollution can travel a long way, and that it can have devastating impacts on our health, culture, livelihood, and environment. We also know that government and corporate promises that everything will be safe cannot be relied on, and that if a problem arises it can take many decades to get any meaningful action, and that the problem can persist for hundreds, if not thousands of years.

We have had enough of pollution. We can't take any more.

A preliminary look at our watershed shows that all of your "General Potential Repository Areas" around Ignace have waters that flow to Grassy Narrows and to the waters that we drink and feed ourselves from (see attached map).


Those waters provide for us and we take care of them.

We also know that that the wind can carry pollution, including radioactivity a long way and that it can be dropped as rain or dust far away from where it started. We do not want this to happen to us, or to our descendants, or to any living beings.

We call on you to stop planning to store nuclear waste near Ignace. We didn't create this mess. Do not dump it in our backyard.



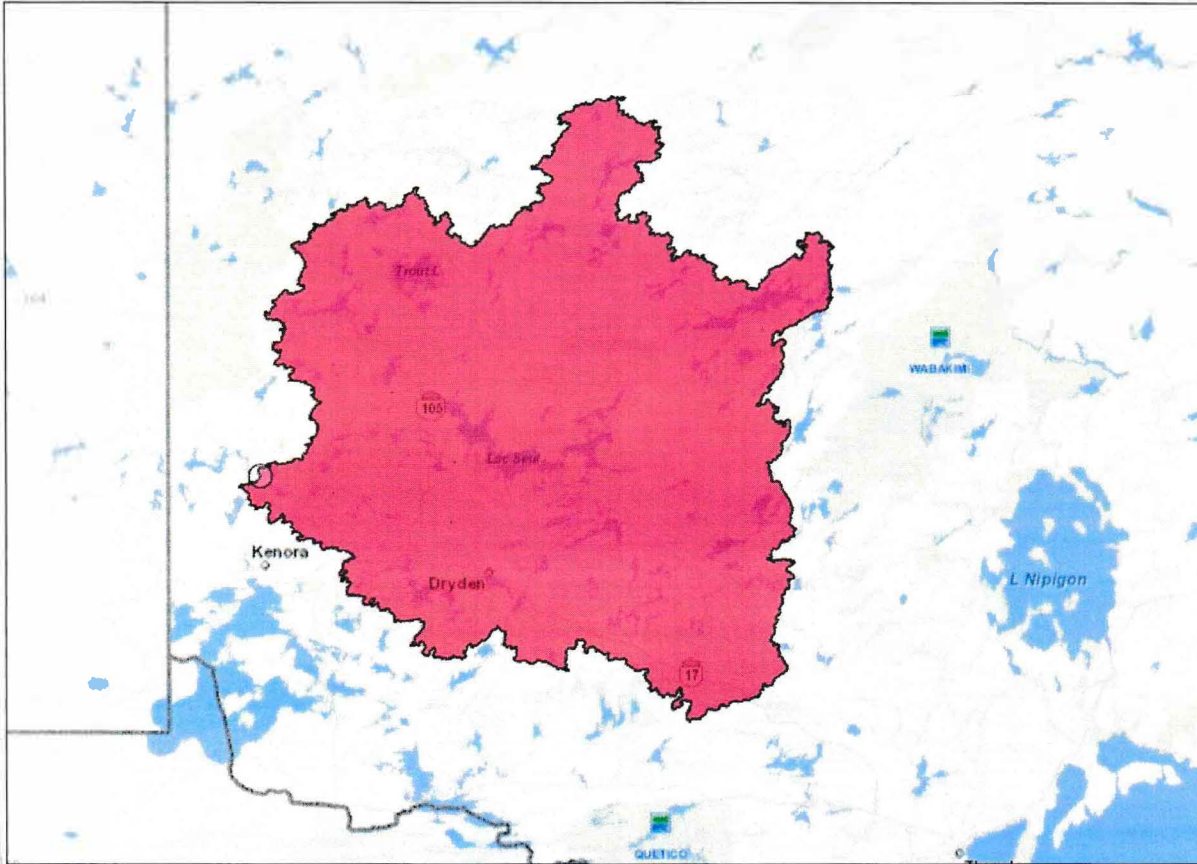

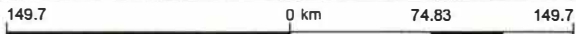

Dear Nuclear Waste Management Organization and Natural Resources Canada:

RE: Nuclear Waste Storage

Asubpeeschoseewagong Anishinabek (Grassy Narrows) remains deeply concerned about the potential for nuclear waste storage upstream from our First Nation. We are further concerned about our exclusion from the site selection process. We have not been meaningfully involved in the process so far at all, our concerns appear to have been ignored, and our correspondence has not been meaningfully responded to.

In June of 2020 we heard through a concerned individual about a deadline for comments on a potential nuclear waste storage site in the Ignace area. Although it was during a pandemic, and we have no capacity funding to inform ourselves and carry out our governance process in relation to this, we wrote to the Nuclear Waste Management Organization (NWMO) on July 1 expressing some of our concerns.

In response we received only a July 9 email with four sentences which appear to be a form response. The response did not acknowledge, nor respond to, any of our concerns. However, it did commit that “[a]fter completing our review process, we will contact you to let you know how your comments have been reflected in next year’s plan.”

We never heard from the NWMO again. However, we see through your website that Ignace remains one of only two locations still under consideration for storage of highly radioactive nuclear waste. We also see that as recently as November 2021 you were conducting extensive drilling in the potential Ignace storage site.

On your website it says that “[t]he project will only move forward in any area with interested communities, along with First Nation, Métis and surrounding communities, working together to implement it.”

We are a First Nation in the area of the potential Ignace site. We are interested. We live downstream from the site. We drink the water and eat the fish who swim in the water that flows from that site. And yet we, and our concerns, appear to be completely excluded from this process.

Does the NWMO commit that the Ignace storage site will only move forward if Grassy Narrows works together to implement it? Will the NWMO respect Grassy Narrows’ right to say ‘no’ to dangerous industrial projects?

We have also become aware that Natural Resources Canada is reviewing their policy on nuclear waste storage. Again, we have no capacity funding to meaningfully participate in this review. However, we would like to make it known that this policy should require the consent of downstream First Nations for any permanent or temporary nuclear waste storage site, and for any nuclear waste transportation route.

We are letting you know, again, that Grassy Narrows is strongly opposed to the storage of nuclear waste near Ignace.

We are deeply concerned that nuclear waste will continue to be dangerous for thousands of generations. We are afraid that it will hurt our people and the environment that we rely on. The waste lasts longer than anyone, including your experts, can reliably predict what will happen.

Our people continue to drink the water from the English River and to eat fish, animals, and plants from this area. We have been doing this since before anyone can remember and we will continue to do this as long as the river flows. As Indigenous people who are in relationship with our land, air and water we the first to feel the impacts of pollution in the environment. We are also often the hardest hit and the last to get help.

From our experience with mercury dumping in Dryden in the Wabigoon river that started in 1962 around 120 km upstream from us, we know that pollution can travel a long way and that it can have devastating impacts on our health, culture, our livelihood, and our environment. 





I am writing to inform you, again, that Grassy Narrows says 'no' to nuclear waste in our Territory, in our region, and anywhere upstream or upwind of our Territory. This is a final decision, and it will not change.

We have learned that you are thinking of setting up a nuclear waste storage site near Ignace, Ontario. This site is upstream of our Territory in the Wabigoon River watershed. The water from that site flows past our reserve and into the waters where we fish, drink, and swim. The material that you want to store there will be dangerous for longer than Canada has existed, longer than Europeans have been on Turtle Island, and longer than anything that human beings have ever built has lasted. How can you reliably claim that this extremely dangerous waste will safely be contained for hundreds of thousands of years? Our watershed and our people have already suffered too many impacts. We cannot accept this further risk to the health of our river and our people.

Although you have never contacted us, our First Nation learned of your plans and wrote to you on July 2, 2020, on February 7, 2022, and on October 7, 2022 to express our concerns. We have never received a response.



RE: Grassy Narrows says 'no' to nuclear waste storage in our watershed

I am writing to inform you, again, that Grassy Narrows says 'no' to nuclear waste in our Territory, in our region, and anywhere upstream or upwind of our Territory. As we have previously stated, this is a final decision, and it will not change.

As you know, the nuclear waste storage site that you are considering near Ignace, Ontario is upstream of our Territory in the Wabigoon River watershed. We reiterate our concerns that nuclear waste poses the potential for the escape of radioactive material, and that any escape would harm us for many generations; our lands would never be the same. Our watershed and our people have already suffered too many impacts from the results of industrial activity, including an ongoing mercury crisis. We cannot accept this further risk to the health of our river and our people.

Even though you never contacted us, Grassy Narrows learned independently of your site selection process and wrote to you several times since 2020. While you initially responded in July 2020, this was not received by Grassy Narrows and you neglected to respond to any subsequent letters up until March 2024, nearly four years after our first correspondence and twelve years after you first identified the Wabigoon River watershed as a potential site. We now understand that you plan to make a final decision later this year on the location for the disposal site.

Last minute engagement with Grassy Narrows in the final months before making a decision that has been many years in the making is not acceptable. You have already narrowed the list of potential disposal sites down to only two in all of Canada. The Wabigoon watershed site is the only remaining site that you are considering that is in the northern Canada and within the Canadian shield. Clearly, you have already made most of your important decisions and have already invested heavily in this option long before even informing us.


We request that you please respond to the following questions to help us better understand your decision-making process:

1. Why was Grassy Narrows excluded, until recently, from engagement surrounding the site selection process?
2. Does NWMO's commitment to proceed in an area with "informed and willing hosts" include downstream communities? If not, why?
3. Does NWMO commit to respecting Grassy Narrows' right to free, prior and informed consent with respect to nuclear waste disposal?
4. Does NWMO commit to respecting Grassy Narrows' Land Declaration, *Manaachitootaa Aki*, and other Grassy Narrows laws?
5. Does NWMO commit to abiding by the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples* ("UNDRIP")?
6. Were existing and planned cumulative effects on Grassy Narrows and on the English-Wabigoon River watersheds taken into account in your decision to make the Wabigoon watershed the only remaining location option in the North? If yes, how?
7. Were the unique circumstances and history of Grassy Narrows taken into account in making your decision to make the Wabigoon watershed the only remaining location option in the North? If yes, how?
8. In making your decisions did you take into account the existing conditions of fear, anxiety, distress, and suicidality in Grassy Narrows? Did you take into account how the threat of nuclear waste storage in our watershed would exacerbate these conditions and frustrate our efforts to heal our community? If yes, how?
9. In making your decisions did you take into account Grassy Narrows' spiritual beliefs and practices about spiritual beings that live within the rocks and their role in spiritual and physical worlds? If yes, how?

11. Do you plan to transport nuclear waste to the site through the Wabigoon River watershed?
