**Subject:** Comments from a NorthWestern Ontario citizen re: Need for a full Impact Assessment Report plus public input re: Revell Lake proposed site for construction of a Deep Geological Repository.

To Whom It May Concern,

I am writing this letter to express my disapproval of the transport and long term storage and abandonment of highly toxic radioactive nuclear waste in Northwestern Ontario. My concerns are as follows:

- 1) The extrication, transport and storage of spent radioactive waste from reactors in various parts of central and eastern Canada to our area has not been fully studied and the consequences of a leak of this contaminant downstream from the Revell Lake proposed site would be catastrophic!
- 2) The proposed Impact Assessment Report does not show an adequate analysis of any consequences that would occur as a result of the handling, transportation and storage of this nuclear waste.
- 3) There needs to be very clear and concise explanation of potentially dangerous consequences related to any transportation of this nuclear waste as this aspect is not currently included in the Impact Assessment Report. The potential for accidents along this route is an increasingly well-documented and very real danger.
- 4) All First Nations affected by this project have not been properly consulted, which is against the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples to which Canada is a signatory.

I have resided in Northwestern Ontario, Red Lake District, for almost 40 years and consider this to be my home. I, as well as friends and family often need to travel to Thunder Bay from Red Lake for essential medical care and basic amenities. This travel is necessary for those of us living in NWO and it is dangerous enough in its current state. The fact that we would/will now have to take into consideration large transport trucks (**2-3 trucks daily** for the next **50 years or more**) is very distressing.

I will never support this project, especially since so much critical detail seems to be missing from the proposal for the initial Impact Assessment Report of a Deep Geological Repository at the Revell Lake Site, Northwest Ontario.
